Monitoring success

The regular business of Local Access Forum includes updates from definitive map, strategic access and operations teams, with reports provided respectively in that order. Members provide feedback and questions, through which progress, workloads and priorities are monitored.

The forum provided advice on the following:

Open Access Land advice

The Forum provided the National Trust with informal advice on their ash die-back tree works at West Wycombe Hill. In addition, advice was provided to Natural England on open access restrictions at Wayside Farm and Chawley Manor Farm, Bledlow. This resulted in changes to the original proposals for the benefit of walkers.

National Government

The Forum have been concerned by locally and nationally with the progress of DMMO's. The Forum wrote to the Rt Hon Michael Gove MP, Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, concerned with the slow progress of DMMO's referred to the Planning Inspectorate [PINS] for determination. They also lobbied [2021] for an extension of the 2026 cut-off date for submission of Definitive Map Modification Orders, which has more recently [2022] been abandoned.

Improving public access: making a difference

Member are involved in following voluntary activities:

- 1. publishing and leading walks in the Chilterns;
- 2. surveying promoted routes and completing BVPI reports;
- 3. trouble-shooting new cycling and walking routes;
- 4. attending Ridgeway Delivery Group meetings;
- 5. lobbying HS2 to address impacts of construction on equestrians; and

6. making DMMO applications.

Scrutiny

The LAF provides independent strategic oversight of the council's public access work, which has multiple positive outcomes for public access. For example, the maintenance team provide a major works programme and minor works summary, togther with Best Value Performance Indicator [BVPI] results. The Definitive Map Team list their workload and the LAF monitor progress of applications for Definitive Map Modification Orders [DMMO's], Public Path Orders [PPO's] and Village Greens [VG's].

Comments from the appointing authority

LAF advice is valued greatly and we are fortunate to have members with a broad range of experience and knowledge in countryside matters. This results in balanced advice, without any particular interest group dominating. Numbers continue to remain good at 14.
